This course explores international security through four main dimensions: a.Theories: Neorealism, Neoliberalism, Constructivism Securitization, and Peace Studies. b.Key Concepts: self-defense, alliances, military diplomacy, arm control, collective and cooperative security. c.Institutions: the UN, peacekeeping operations, arms control agreements, nuclear strategy, and non-proliferation. d.Contemporary Issues: arms trade, counter-terrorism, counter insurgency, the responsibility to protect (R2P), climate change technological change, and cybersecurity.
